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### **SBA Offers Disaster Assistance to Florida Businesses and Residents Affected by March 12 Tornado in Marion County**

**WASHINGTON** – Florida businesses and residents affected by the tornado on March 12 may apply for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration, [SBA Administrator Isabella Casillas Guzman](#) announced today.

Administrator Guzman made the loans available in response to a letter from Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis on March 24 requesting a disaster declaration by the SBA. Businesses and residents in the declared area can now apply for low-interest disaster loans from the SBA.

The declaration includes Marion County and the adjacent counties of Alachua, Citrus, Lake, Levy, Putnam, Sumter and Volusia in **Florida**.

“SBA’s mission-driven team stands ready to help **Florida** small businesses and residents impacted by the tornado,” said Administrator Guzman. “We’re committed to providing federal disaster loans swiftly and efficiently, with a customer-centric approach to help businesses and communities recover and rebuild.”

To assist businesses and residents affected by the disaster, the SBA will open a Disaster Loan Outreach Center (DLOC) in Marion County on Monday, April 4 at the location and time as indicated below:

Customer Service Representatives will be available at the DLOC to answer questions about the disaster loan program and help individuals complete their applications. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the SBA has established protocols to help protect the health and safety of the public. All visitors to the DLOC are encouraged to wear a face mask.

“Businesses and private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace disaster-damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory, and other business assets,” said SBA’s North Florida District Director Jon “Malcolm” Richards.

For small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations, the SBA offers [Economic Injury Disaster Loans \(EIDL\)](#) to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. EIDL Loan assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any physical property damage.

“Loans up to \$200,000 are available to homeowners to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners and renters are eligible for loans up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property,” said Kem Fleming, director of SBA’s Field Operations Center East in Atlanta.

Applicants may be eligible for a loan amount increase up to 20 percent of their physical damages, as verified by the SBA for mitigation purposes. Eligible mitigation improvements may include a safe room or storm shelter, sump pump, French drain, or retaining wall to help protect property and occupants from future damage caused by a similar disaster.

Interest rates are as low as **2.94** percent for businesses, **1.875** percent for nonprofit organizations, and **1.438** percent for homeowners and renters, with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by the SBA and are based on each applicant’s financial condition.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA’s secure website at [DisasterLoanAssistance.sba.gov/ela/s](https://DisasterLoanAssistance.sba.gov/ela/s) and should apply under SBA declaration # **17379**.

The filing deadline to return applications for physical property damage is **May 27, 2022**. The deadline to return economic injury applications is **Dec. 28, 2022**.
