 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Cosmetic Safety for5 Communities of Color and Professional Salon Workers Act
 - 6 of 2023".

3 SEC. 3. RESEARCH ON HEALTH DISPARITIES IMPACTING

4 **COMMUNITIES OF COLOR.**

5 Part P of title III of the Public Health Service Act
6 (42 U.S.C. 280 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end
7 the following:

8 "SEC. 399V-8. RESEARCH ON HEALTH DISPARITIES RE-9 LATED TO COSMETICS IMPACTING COMMU-

10 NITIES OF COLOR.

11 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall—

"(1) conduct, or award grants for, research, including community-based participatory research, relating to epidemiological, clinical, ecological, and social scientific investigations into—

"(A) the chemicals that are linked to adverse health effects and most commonly found
in cosmetics marketed to women and girls of
color, including beauty, personal hygiene, and
intimate care products;

"(B) the use of cosmetics containing such
 chemicals by women and girls of color across
 their lifespans;
 "(C) the specific adverse health effects experienced by women and girls of color from exposure to unsafe chemicals present in cosmetics

7 used by them; and

8 "(D) interventions that reduce exposure to, 9 or harm done by exposure to, unsafe chemicals 10 present in cosmetics used by women and girls 11 of color; and

12 "(2) disseminate the results of the investiga-13 tions conducted or supported under paragraph (1) to 14 help communities of color identify and address po-15 tentially unsafe chemical exposures in the use of cos-16 metics.

17 "(b) REPORT.—Not later than 5 years after awarding the first grant under subsection (a), the Secretary shall 18 19 make publicly available on the website of the Department 20 of Health and Human Services and submit to the Com-21 mittee on Energy and Commerce of the House of Rep-22 resentatives and the Committee on Health, Education, 23 Labor, and Pensions of the Senate a report on the results 24 of the investigations conducted or supported under sub-25 section (a), including—

1	"(1) summary findings on—
2	"(A) marketing strategies, product cat-
3	egories, and specific cosmetics containing
4	chemicals linked to adverse health effects; and
5	"(B) the demographics of the populations
6	marketed to and using these cosmetics; and
7	"(2) recommended public health information
8	strategies to reduce potentially unsafe exposures
9	from cosmetics.
10	"(c) ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible to receive a grant
11	under subsection (a), an eligible entity shall be any of the
12	following:
13	"(1) An accredited institution of higher edu-
14	cation.
15	"(2) A community-based organization.
16	"(3) A nongovernmental organization with ex-
17	pertise working with communities of color.
18	"(d) Authorization of Appropriations.—To
19	carry out this section, there is authorized to be appro-
20	priated \$7,500,000, for the period of fiscal years begin-
21	ning with the fiscal year including the date of enactment
22	of this section and running through the fifth fiscal year
23	commencing after such date of enactment.".

1	SEC. 4. RESEARCH ON HEALTH CONCERNS IMPACTING
2	PROFESSIONAL NAIL, HAIR, AND BEAUTY
3	SALON WORKERS.
4	Part P of title III of the Public Health Service Act
5	(42 U.S.C. 280 et seq.), as amended by section 3, is fur-
6	ther amended by adding at the end the following:
7	"SEC. 399V-9. RESEARCH ON HEALTH CONCERNS IMPACT-
8	ING PROFESSIONAL NAIL, HAIR, AND BEAUTY
9	SALON WORKERS.
10	"(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall—
11	"(1) conduct, or award grants for, research, in-
12	cluding community-based participatory research, re-
13	lating to epidemiological, clinical, ecological, and so-
14	cial scientific investigations into—
15	"(A) the chemicals that are linked to ad-
16	verse health effects and most commonly found
17	in cosmetics used by professional nail, hair, and
18	beauty salon workers;
19	"(B) the types and categories of profes-
20	sional salon products containing such chemicals
21	and the availability of safer alternatives;
22	"(C) the specific adverse health effects ex-
23	perienced by professional nail, hair, and beauty
24	salon workers from exposure to unsafe chemi-
25	cals present in cosmetics used in nail, hair, and
26	beauty salons; and

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1	"(D) interventions that reduce exposure to,
2	or harm done by exposure to, unsafe chemicals
3	present in cosmetics used in nail, hair, and
4	beauty salons; and
5	"(2) disseminate the results of the investiga-
6	tions conducted or supported under paragraph (1) to
7	help professional nail, hair, and beauty salon work-
8	ers identify and eliminate potentially unsafe chem-
9	ical exposures in their workplace.
10	"(b) ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible to receive a grant
11	under subsection (a), an entity shall be any of the fol-
12	lowing:
13	"(1) An accredited institution of higher edu-
14	cation.
15	"(2) A community-based organization.
16	"(3) A nongovernmental organization with ex-
17	pertise working with communities of color or immi-
18	grant populations.
19	"(c) REPORT.—Not later than 5 years after awarding
20	the first grant under this section, the Secretary shall make
21	publicly available and submit to the Committee on Energy
22	and Commerce of the House of Representatives and the
23	Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions of
24	the Senate a report on the results of the investigations
25	conducted or supported under subsection (a), including—

1	"(1) summary findings, with respect to profes-
2	sional nail, hair, and beauty salon workers, on—
3	"(A) chemicals of concern and products
4	and product categories containing ingredients
5	linked to adverse health effects; and
6	"(B) the demographics of the populations
7	using these products and product categories;
8	and
9	((2) recommended occupational health informa-
10	tion strategies for professional nail, hair, and beauty
11	salon workers to reduce potentially unsafe exposures
12	to cosmetics.
13	"(d) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term 'salon
14	worker' means a licensed or nonlicensed cosmetologist,
15	nail technician, barber, or esthetician who applies or ad-
16	ministers a cosmetic within the scope of their business
17	practices.
18	"(e) Authorization of Appropriations.—To
19	carry out this section, there is authorized to be appro-
20	priated \$7,500,000, for the period of fiscal years begin-
21	ning with the fiscal year including the date of enactment
22	of this section and running through the fifth fiscal year
23	commencing after such date of enactment.".

1 SEC. 5. SUPPORT FOR CREATING SAFER ALTERNATIVES.

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Health and 3 Human Services (in this section referred to as the "Secretary"), acting through the Commissioner of Food and 4 5 Drugs, in consultation with the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, shall award grants to sup-6 7 port research focused on the design of cosmetic chemicals that have no inherent toxicity or association with adverse 8 9 health effects.

(b) PRIORITY.—In awarding grants under subsection
(a), the Secretary shall give priority to applicants proposing to focus on—

(1) replacing chemicals in professional cosmetic
products used by professional nail, hair, and beauty
salon workers with chemicals that are not associated
with adverse health events;

17 (2) replacing chemicals in cosmetic products
18 marketed to women and girls of color, including any
19 such beauty, personal hygiene, and intimate care
20 products, with chemicals that are not associated with
21 adverse health events; or

(3) providing assistance in creating safer product formulations to minority-owned cosmetic companies that are manufacturing and marketing cosmetic
products to women or girls of color or professional
nail, hair, and beauty salon workers.

(c) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term "salon
 worker" means a licensed or nonlicensed cosmetologist,
 nail technician, barber, or esthetician who applies or ad ministers a cosmetic within the scope of their business
 practices.

6 (d) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—To carry 7 out this section, there is authorized to be appropriated 8 \$10,000,000 for the period of fiscal years beginning with 9 the fiscal year including the date of enactment of this sec-10 tion and running through the fifth fiscal year commencing 11 after such date of enactment.

12 SEC. 6. NATIONAL RESOURCE CENTER ON BEAUTY JUS-13 TICE.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Health and
Human Services, acting through the Deputy Assistant
Secretary for Minority Health, shall award a grant to an
eligible entity to establish a National Resource Center on
Beauty Justice for the purpose of addressing unsafe cosmetic chemical exposures experienced by—

- 20 (1) women and girls of color;
- 21 (2) men and boys of color;
- 22 (3) immigrant populations;
- 23 (4) language minorities;
- 24 (5) the LGBTQIA community; and

1 (6) other underserved populations as deter-2 mined appropriate by the Deputy Assistant Sec-3 retary for Minority Health for purposes of this subsection. 4 5 (b) ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible to receive a grant under subsection (a), an eligible entity shall be a commu-6 7 nity-based or other nonprofit organization that— 8 (1) has a primary focus on eliminating toxic 9 chemical exposures linked to increasing rates of dis-10 ease; and 11 (2) works with culturally and linguistically di-12 verse minority communities, including populations 13 traditionally underserved due to-14 (A) their immigration status; 15 (B) geographic location; (C) sexual orientation; 16 17 (D) gender identity; or 18 (E) language barriers. (c) USE OF FUNDS.—The National Resource Center 19 20 on Beauty Justice funded through this section shall use 21 such funds to carry out activities and initiatives that are 22 for the purpose described in subsection (a) and driven by 23 the needs, opportunities, and priorities of communities of 24 color, which may include activities and initiatives designed

25 to-

1 (1) conduct community outreach and organizing 2 and develop community-based interventions that em-3 power and equip communities of color with the infor-4 mation they need to select safe, non-toxic cosmetics; 5 (2) develop and implement outreach, awareness, 6 and education strategies targeted at women and 7 girls of color, men and boys of color, immigrant pop-8 ulations, language minorities, and other underserved 9 populations, to decrease unsafe cosmetic chemical 10 exposures experienced by these populations;

(3) create or develop collaborative partnerships
to educate and train, and create best practices for,
relevant stakeholders including nongovernmental organizations, health care professionals, sororities and
fraternal organizations, community leaders, professional salon workers, faith leaders, teachers, and
leaders from the LGBTQIA community;

(4) develop educational curricula and outreach
strategies for middle and high schools and institutions of higher education that include linguistically,
culturally, and community relevant content and suggested interventions for youth populations; or

(5) create public education campaigns utilizing
culturally and linguistically appropriate images and
messaging for targeted populations including com-

munity members, youth, health care professionals,
 salon workers, teachers, and other thought leaders.
 (d) REPORT.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after 5 the date of enactment of this Act, and annually 6 thereafter, the recipient of the grant under sub-7 section (a) shall submit an annual report to the Sec-8 retary of Health and Human Services and the Con-9 gress regarding activities carried out pursuant to the 10 grant and an evaluation of the results of the activi-11 ties.

(2) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—The Secretary of
Health and Human Services, acting through the
Deputy Assistant Secretary for Minority Health,
shall make each report under paragraph (1) available to the public by posting a copy of the report on
the website of the Office of Minority Health.

(e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
\$2,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2024 through 2028.
SEC. 7. TRANSLATION OF AND ACCESS TO SAFETY DATA
SHEETS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 18 months after
the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Labor
shall issue a standard under section 6 of the Occupational

1	Safety and Health Act of 1970 (29 U.S.C. 655) that re-
2	quires the following:
3	(1) Each manufacturer or importer selling any
4	cosmetic for professional use shall—
5	(A) obtain or develop a safety data sheet
6	described in subsection (b) for each such cos-
7	metic that—
8	(i) the manufacturer or importer pro-
9	duces or imports; and
10	(ii) includes a hazardous chemical, or
11	a product ingredient associated with any
12	chemical hazard, that is classified as a
13	health hazard in accordance with the cri-
14	teria found in section 1910.1200(d) of title
15	29 of the Code of Federal Regulations, and
16	any successor regulations; and
17	(B) make the safety data sheet available
18	on the manufacturer or importer's website (in
19	addition to any other required manner of mak-
20	ing such sheet available) to distributors and
21	employers, including owners of hair, nail, and
22	beauty salons or spas or other establishments
23	that provide cosmetic services for humans, in
24	English, Spanish, Vietnamese, Chinese, Korean,
25	and upon request other languages.

1	(2) Each distributor of a cosmetic for profes-
2	sional use shall distribute and provide safety data
3	sheets described in subsection (b) in the same man-
4	ner as a distributor of a chemical hazard is required
5	to distribute and provide safety data sheets under
6	section 1910.1200(g) of title 29, Code of Federal
7	Regulations, or any successor regulations.
8	(3) Each employer, including any operator of a
9	salon or other establishment described in paragraph
10	(1)(B), shall—
11	(A) have a safety data sheet in the work-
12	place for each cosmetic for professional use that
13	is used in the course of the employer's business;
14	(B) make such safety data sheet available
15	to all employees of the employer who are ex-
16	posed or use the product to the same extent
17	and in the same manner as safety data sheets
18	are required to be made available under section
19	1910.1200(g) of title 29, Code of Federal Reg-
20	ulations, or any successor regulations; and
21	(C) upon request, provide employees with
22	translations of such safety data sheet in other
23	languages, including Spanish, Vietnamese, Chi-
24	nese, Korean, and upon request other lan-
25	guages.

(b) CONTENTS OF SAFETY DATA SHEET.—A safety
 data sheet for a cosmetic for professional use described
 in this section shall—

4 (1) contain the information required in a safety
5 data sheet under section 1910.1200(g) of title 29,
6 Code of Federal Regulations, or any successor regulations, for each hazardous chemical, or product in8 gredient associated with any chemical hazard, described in subsection (a)(1)(A)(ii); and

10 (2) include the following statement: "This safe11 ty data sheet is also available in multiple languages
12 by contacting the manufacturer, using the contact
13 information provided on this sheet.".

14 (c) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

15 (1) INGREDIENT.—The term "ingredient"
16 means an intentionally added chemical in a cosmetic
17 that has a technical or functional effect, including—

18 (A) the breakdown products of an inten19 tionally added chemical that also have a func20 tional or technical effect in the cosmetic;

(B) a fragrance, flavor, preservative, or
colorant (and the components thereof); and

(C) any individual component that the Secretary deems an ingredient for purposes of this
section.

(2) MANUFACTURER.—The term "manufac turer" means the entity that produces ingredients or
 combines one or more ingredients to produce a cos metic product.

5 (3) PROFESSIONAL.—The term "professional"
6 has the meaning given to such term in section
7 609(c) of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act
8 (21 U.S.C. 364e(c)).

9 SEC. 8. NATIONAL RESOURCE CENTER ON SALON WORKER 10 HEALTH AND SAFETY.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Health and
Human Services, acting through the Deputy Assistant
Secretary for Minority Health, shall award a grant to an
eligible entity to establish a National Resource Center on
Salon Worker Health and Safety for the purpose of addressing unsafe cosmetic chemical exposures experienced
by—

- 18 (1) women and girls of color;
- 19 (2) men and boys of color;
- 20 (3) immigrant populations;
- 21 (4) language minorities;
- 22 (5) the LGBTQIA community; and

23 (6) other underserved populations as deter-24 mined appropriate by the Deputy Assistant Sec-

1	retary for Minority Health for purposes of this sub-
2	section.
3	(b) ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible to receive a grant
4	under subsection (a), an entity shall be a community-
5	based or other nonprofit organization that—
6	(1) has a primary focus on eliminating toxic
7	chemical exposures linked to increasing rates of dis-
8	ease; and
9	(2) works with culturally and linguistically di-
10	verse minority communities, including populations
11	traditionally underserved due to—
12	(A) their immigration status;
13	(B) geographic location;
14	(C) sexual orientation;
15	(D) gender identity; or
16	(E) language barriers.
17	(c) USE OF FUNDS.—The National Resource Center
18	on Salon Worker Health and Safety funded through this
19	section shall use such funds to carry out activities and
20	initiatives that are for the purpose described in subsection
21	(a) and driven by the needs, opportunities, and priorities
22	of communities of color, which may include activities and
23	initiatives designed to—

(1) develop and disseminate information, edu cational resources, training, and technical assistance
 to diverse populations of salon workers;

4 (2) conduct culturally appropriate and lan5 guage-specific salon worker outreach and develop
6 and implement culturally appropriate interventions
7 that empower and equip salon workers with the in8 formation they need to select safe, non-toxic hair,
9 nail, and beauty salon products;

(3) create culturally specific outreach strategies,
resource materials, training curricula, and training
programs to serve, and build the capacity of, community-based organizations seeking to support culturally diverse and language-diverse populations of
professional salon workers; or

(4) create or develop collaborative partnerships
to create, and educate and train regarding, best
practices for health care professionals and other relevant stakeholders to identify and treat the negative
health impacts experienced by professional salon
workers because of toxic cosmetic chemical exposures.

23 (d) Report.—

24 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after25 the date of enactment of this Act, and annually

thereafter, the recipient of the grant under subsection (a) shall submit an annual report to the Secretary of Health and Human Services and the Congress regarding activities carried out pursuant to the
grant and an evaluation of the results of the activities.

7 (2) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—The Secretary of
8 Health and Human Services, acting through the
9 Deputy Assistant Secretary for Minority Health,
10 shall make each report under paragraph (1) avail11 able to the public by posting a copy of the report on
12 the website of the Office of Minority Health.

(e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
\$2,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2024 through 2028.
